










Garden Vegetables 3-part cards







Which Light is **Best for Plants?**

Plant several bean seeds in each of three pots. Put one by the window in a sunny spot. Put one under a lamp in a dark room. Put one inside a box where there is no light. Water each plant every day. After a week, draw a picture of each plant's growth. Which grew the best?

Seed Travel

Plant Journa

Plant radish, cucumber, bean, lettuce, and watermelon seeds in five different cups. Keep then in a sunny spot and water them every day. Draw their growth after one, two, and three weeks.



























Note to Parents and Teachers: Provide students with four different seeds. Have them draw the seeds in the boxes. They can blow through a straw to see if the seed travels by air. They can put a sock on their hand and see if the seed sticks to see if the seed is hitchhiker. They can put the seed in a bowl of water and watch if it floats to learn if the seed travels by water.

Which Liquid is Best?

Water your plants every day. After a week or two, draw them. Which liquid is the best for plants?













Note to Parents and Teachers: Have students plant several bean seeds in each not. Fach day, have them water each pot with a different liquid. After a week or two, have the students draw each plant. Which liquid helps plants grow the best? The images are: milk, soda, water, juice, coffee or hot chocolate, and your choice. Suggestions for the last pot are lemonade, vinegar, tea, or a different




Which flower smells the best? Circle its number!





Sensory Play Ideas

Sensory bins

Base materials could be dry rice, shredded brown paper, dirt and rocks, or potting soil. Extras might include garden pots, child sized gardening tools, real or artificial flowers, and plastic bugs.
